Harvard Education Programs Flourish in Cambridge Public Schools

Harvard programs, learning experiences, and mentoring opportunities touch every grade level and every public school in Cambridge. Last year, every middle school child in Cambridge's upper schools participated in Harvard-affiliated programs. Examples include the programs below:

A Harvard Graduate School of Education (HGSE) program, EcoMUVE uses 3-D virtual worlds that have a look and feel similar to video games to teach 6th graders a deeper understanding of ecosystems and casual patterns.

Project TEACH, an early college awareness program for all 7th graders, is building on existing programming to offer new opportunities for students to

select and explore various programs of study during their on-campus visits beginning Spring 2014.

Harvard's School of Engineering and Applied Sciences (SEAS) hosts all 8th graders on campus each spring to showcase the students' science and engineering. In addition, graduate students work with students and teachers in some schools.

Each year, more than 6,000 program participants from Cambridge take part in dozens of mentoring and enrichment programs, visit the University's museums, and learn from Harvard educators. Visit www.community.harvard.edu to learn more.

Harvard Continues to Strengthen Partnership with Local Libraries

A longtime partner of the Boston and Cambridge Public Library systems, Harvard continues to support a range of initiatives both in the library branches and on the university's campus.

In September, the Cambridge Public Library held its citywide book club Cambridge READS at Harvard's Sanders Theatre, kicking off a new academic year of literary and education-based collaborations. Author Edwidge Danticat was introduced by a Haitian dance performance by Jean Appolon Expressions and then presented on her recent book "Claire of the Sea".

On Oct. 23, Harvard Professor of Germanc Languages and Literature Maria Tatar will present a lecture titled "The Big Bad Wolf Reconsidered: Predator and Prey in Fairytales Today". Professor Tatar will track how fairy tales have been revived and reinvented over the past decades and how they have migrated into the mainstream of popular culture.

Across the river in Boston, Harvard authors will present as part of the Boston Public Library Author Talk Series. Coming up on Nov. 19, Joshua Greene, associate professor of the social sciences at Harvard, will discuss his book "Moral Tribes: Emotion, Reason, and the Gap Between Us and Them."
