Grant awards provide essential support for a variety of University activities. This quarter, Cal U

faculty and staff were successful in bringing more than \$2.3 million in grant funding to the University.

Among the largest grants was an award of nearly \$650,000 from the U.S. Department of Education to support the Upward Bound college readiness program in Fayette and Greene counties. The Education Department also awarded almost \$393,000 to continue an English As a Second Language professional development project with Intermediate Unit 1 and \$285,000 for student support services in the upcoming academic year. And the Defense Logistics Agency provided over \$205,000 to support the Government Agency Coordination Office, or GACO.

Other major grants continue support for the Teaching with Primary Sources program and provide software licenses for the Earth Sciences Department.

Our thanks to all the faculty and staff members who devote themselves to the painstaking process of seeking grants. Your efforts are paying off!

A number of students put Cal U on the map this summer by completing high-profile internships. They include anthropology major Casey Bricker, who analyzed 19th-century skeletons at the Smithsonian's National Museum of Natural History. She was one of just 17 undergraduates selected

for a highly competitive program funded by the National Science Foundation. Economics major Keri Potter also interned at the Smithsonian, where she worked in the Office of Policy and Analysis. Matt Lyons, a sport management major, completed his internship with the undefeated Pittsburgh Passion professional women's football team. And management major Jacquelyn Pierce worked with Quicksilver, a surf-wear company in Huntingdon, California. Jack Shope, a political science major, spent his summer with the Governor's Innovation Office, which works to improve efficiency in state government. And three criminal justice majors -Stephen Fortunato, Ashley Jeffrey and Rachel Breisinger — interned with the police department in Ocean City, Maryland. These internships are so competitive that the candidates had to pass polygraphs!

As the new semester begins, the University welcomes six new professors. Dr. Ali Osareh is teaching in the Department of Applied Engineering and Technology. Dr. Ambrus Price joins the political science faculty, and Dr. Lindsey McGuire is teaching in the Health Science Department. Professor Rebecca Maddas is in Childhood Education, Dr. Theresa Thao Pham is in Social Work, and Dr. Rueben Brock, in the Psychology Department, is our Frederick Douglass Institute Scholar this year.

Cal U In London

In June, eight graduate students from the MA in Applied Criminology program studied under Dr. John Cencich (Criminal Justice) in London as part of their capstone experience. The students worked directly with members of the Metropolitan Police on cases involving attempted murder, kidnapping, aggravated assault and other serious crimes. The academic experience also included visits to Parliament and Old Bailey, a private tour of the Police Museum, and an exclusive look at the work of Scotland Yard's Special Operations Unit (SO1) at No. 10 Downing Street, the residence of the Prime Minister. Finally, the students walked the streets of Whitechapel where they undertook a comparative behavioral crime analysis relative to the notorious Jack the Ripper
