CAMBRIDGE-HARVARD SUMMER ACADEMY

Celebrating 10 years of Summer Learning for Cambridge Youth

In addition to enjoying traditional summer activities in the city, 350 Cambridge high school students benefited from the strong partnership between the Harvard Graduate School of Education and the City of Cambridge this past summer by participating in the Cambridge-Harvard Summer Academy (CHSA). Celebrating its 10-year anniversary, CHSA is a free program that offers Cambridge students the opportunity to gain credits for missed or failed courses or to accelerate their learning by taking courses for enrichment.

Students this summer were able to explore their imagination and test their skills through a project-based program that culminated in the academy's student exhibition in August. Projects included a design for what a high school would look like in 2050, original essays and poems, poster displays about their interests, a mock trial about evolution, and dance performances.

"This year's CHSA exceeded our expectations in many ways," said HGSE Director of Teacher Education Katherine Merseth.

"We enrolled the largest number of students ever – more than 350 – which is a clear indication of the need for such a program. The projects completed by the students were creative, substantive, and totally engaging as evidenced by the interest on the part of families and other individuals at the pubic exhibition event and the display of artifacts in the Harvard Square windows along Massachusetts Avenue," Merseth said.



CHSA represents one of many programs and partnerships between Harvard and Cambridge. Last year alone, more than 600 Harvard students volunteered in excess of 60,000 hours helping thousands of Cambridge students through various programs. More than 6,000 program participants from Cambridge schools take part in mentoring and enrichment programs, visit the University's museums, and learn from Harvard educators each year.
