Thanking Our Vets for Their Service

Brian Fountaine, AMD'17, was a 24-year-old Army sergeant and tank commander in Iraq when an IED blew up beneath his Humvee, shearing off both legs below the knee. After surviving a near-fatal blood clot and getting fitted for prostheses, he channeled his rage into recovery and then turned his sights to college. "I don't believe in luck or fate," he says. "It's about human perseverance."

Now, thanks to Northeastern's Phi Gamma Pi Veterans Scholarship-established by alumni of the former fraternity--Fountaine is pursuing his bachelor's degree at the College of Arts, Media and Design, set to graduate in 2017.

Nearly 500 veterans and their spouses and children currently study at Northeastern, about a third of them aided by the Yellow Ribbon Program, an extension of the Post-9/11 GI Bill. According to Northeastern's Veteran Services Specialist Andy McCarty, the university has an exceptional track record of providing services to vets and their dependents. However, many still have unmet financial needs. "Most of our vets don't qualify for Yellow Ribbon or have limited GI Bill eligibility" he says. "Any number of hurdles can make earning a degree challenging."

What makes us happy? Why would a rational person act irrationally? Can


our emotions make us safer, or better prepared for challenges? Thanks to a generous \$50,000 investment by the Konar Family Foundation, researchers at Northeastern's Affective Science Institute (ASI) will have the flexibility and time to devote to answering these questions. The gift from university parent Howard Konar is unusual in that it's directed at the process--the details that may sound mundane but actually make

research happen--rather than at the final result. Such support allows the ASI, led by psychology professor David DeSteno, to hire administrators who organize and coordinate a wide array of activities. This frees up faculty to spend more time on the science of emotion--and less time on the administrative side of things.

When Konar's son, Alex, AS'09, was a psychology student, he often spoke about his newfound passion for understanding the scientific aspects of emotion, and about the classes he was then taking with DeSteno. So when Northeastern hosted an interdisciplinary panel discussion on the science and economics of happiness, the elder

Konar was curious and attended with his son. "I was impressed by the immediate applications of this research, and by the way the ASI faculty collaborated with other scholars in the area," says Konar. "I asked Dave to tell me the one thing that would help him and his team the most. When he said that he'd like to spend more time doing research, writing grant proposals, and reaching out to

"The Konar family is increasing our research output and helping to sustain the work of the ASI," says DeSteno. "In this way, we can play a crucial role in helping Northeastern create knowledge that affects our society."
