ACDC Brings Reds & Procter Gamble to Avondale

The Reds Community Fund and P&G North America Marketing along with Cincinnati Children's Hospital Medical Center and the Cincinnati Zoo and Botanical Garden have announced plans to renovate two baseball fields and to add a third diamond at the Hirsch Recreation Center. In addition, they will be constructing a second greenhouse and undertake major building and landscaping improvements next door at Gabriel's Place. Mark Curnutte of the Enquirer has closely documented changes and challenges in Avondale in its Saving Avondale series, which debuted in March 2012. Leaders of the Reds Community Fund helped make the final decision to award Avondale the Reds/P&G Community Makeover. The hope is that the upgraded Hirsch baseball fields, which will feature homerun fences and scoreboards — in addition to a new T-ball diamond — will increase participation in youth baseball in Avondale. The Avondale project will begin immediately and will culminate August 8th when more than 300 volunteers from P&G North America Marketing will swarm Avondale for a day of construction, weeding, painting, cleaning, and revitalization. Additional support will be provided by members of the Great American Ball Park grounds crew. Other project sponsors are Green B.E.A.N., a produce home-delivery service based locally in Arlington Heights, the Uptown Consortium and Local Initiatives Support Corporation Greater Cincinnati & Northern Kentucky.

ACDC Proposes repurposing St. Andrew's Church

ACDC is partnering with the Church of the Resurrection (COR) on the proposed repurposing of the historic St. Andrew's Church at 3405 Reading Road. St. Andrew's Church situated at the corner of Blair and Reading Road closed in 2010. The church, which is located in the heart of Avondale, its architectural appeal and historic significance, makes it an ideal site for the proposed "Avondale Renaissance Center." The new Center will give Avondale a venue to create positive cultural, educational, and workforce development experiences that will enhance the quality of life for everyone living and working in Avondale by providing a broad range of programs in arts, enrichment and life-long learning, creating workforce/social enterprises opportunities, special events, office and artist studio space. To help move the project forward, ACDC and COR collaborated in preparation and submission of the 2013 Duke Energy Urban Revitalization Initiative (URI) grant application. The URI grants are designed to help spur job growth and retention and economic development in urban core communities served by Duke Energy thus impacting local community vitality. If our project is selected by the Duke Energy Foundation to receive the grant it will be used by ACDC and COR to assist with planning and design of the Avondale Renaissance Center.
