


## **TECHNICAL STUDY GROUP**

#### **GOAL ANALYSIS**

Goals were prevalent in this edition of the FIFA U-20 World Cup, with only two matches (both in the group phase) ending in goalless draws. We witnessed 153 goals – 13 more than at the FIFA U-20 World Cup 2017, the rate of 2.9 goals per game was in keeping with the majority of previous editions. The numbers for Poland 2019 were certainly assisted by Norway's 12-0 win over Honduras, the biggest victory in the competition's history, which featured a nine-goal haul for striker Erling Håland (19).

Effective use was made of the lateral areas, with a large proportion of goals occurring from crosses, cutbacks or precise balls whipped in to the dangerous zone between the goalkeeper and retreating defenders. Driving runs from the wide areas and great technical ability created these openings, which the attacking players in the box did not fail to capitalise on.

Although organised high pressing was not widespread, when teams did manage to regain the ball they were ruthless in their conversion of these openings with only a few touches needed to break through the opponent's lines. Catching teams at their most vulnerable when unbalanced and open by exploiting their mistakes allowed the launching of rapid transitions and provided the opportunity to find space and time in front of goal.



At the 2018 FIFA World Cup Russia<sup>TM</sup>, which represents the highest level of competition, 37% of goals were scored from set-plays, whereas dead-ball dominance was not as prominent in Poland, with only 27% of goals being scored in this manner. We did, however, witness three critical game-changing set-play goals in the knockout stage: two quickly taken free kicks by Mali and Korea Republic caught their opponents off guard, the latter taking the Asian team through to the final. Korea Republic had previously required a perfectly delivered corner deep into second-half stoppage time to force extra time in their quarter-final match against Senegal.



#### **BALLS BEHIND THE DEFENCE**



The defensive approach from finalists Ukraine and Korea Republic, who both used a solid block of three central defenders supported by two holding midfielders, allowed these teams to manage the space in front and behind them. Ukraine's compact defensive block coupled with the presence of the tournament's best goalkeeper Andriy Lunin (1), made them a very difficult target for their opposition, as illustrated by the fact that they conceded only four goals in seven matches. When teams at this



tournament lost control of these areas, alluring spaces behind their defensive lines were presented for quick, intelligent attackers to make runs into. The timing of the movements accompanied by perfectly weighted through-balls, created numerous goalscoring opportunities, many of which were expertly converted.

The quality of execution on show in the final third was notable. The ability of a number of individuals, who possessed the capacity to find pockets of space and deliver the final touch, made this tournament a showpiece in this regard. The winner of the Golden Ball, Korea Republic's Lee Kangin (10), was one of the most prominent examples in terms of delivering clinical passes. Attacking players were able to quickly punish sides that lost balance and organisation. It was clear to see that players possessed vision and mutual understanding, with teams attacking the space in coordination, creating openings in front of goal. This was also a confirmation of the work done by the coaching staff to neutralise and break down their opponents while at the same time maximising the chances to break the rivals' defensive lines and adapt to tactical changes during the games.

#### **VERTICAL PROGRESSIVE PLAY**

Both runners-up Korea Republic and eventual winners Ukraine entered the final with an average of 44% ball possession, in line with one of the main trends observed at the 2018 FIFA World Cup, where champions France had exactly the same percentage in the knockout stage. This can be seen as linked to an "efficiency-driven approach" whereby teams focus on playing in smaller spaces, staying compact and triggering fast transitions.

It was clear during this tournament that teams had a vertical mindset and looked to drive the ball forward quickly, bypassing opponents' lines with crisp passes or driving runs. We observed quality examples of link-up play between and inside all three lines. Midfielders positioned themselves to receive the ball from defenders when building and then had the ability to deliver perfectly weighted through-balls allowing vertical progression. These stressed the overarching role of quick attacks instead of endless elaboration and possession. The movement of the ball from back to front was simply impressive, thus highlighting the teams' strong tactical awareness as well as the premise that talent and technique remain the key element.


It was rare to observe central midfielders dropping down to split the two centre-backs to generate attacking actions. Instead, we saw centre-backs, such as the USA's Chris Richards (5), with the ability to deliver key line-breaking passes or to drive the ball forwards into spaces, allowing the midfielders to take more attacking positions higher up the pitch. On



occasion, the use of the long ball was also apparent, where a "target man" was used to retain and deliver the ball as a more direct route to the final third.

#### **SWITCH OF PLAY OPENING THE ATTACK**

As part of the efficiency-driven approach displayed by the majority of teams, the use of the high press was not the predominant feature during the competition, meaning that when in possession, a team typically found the opposition in shape and attempting to close the spaces. Playing long balls and finding openings in the lateral areas on occasions provided an answer. The lack of pressure on the ball allowed time to play lofted diagonals to wide midfielders

or progressing full-backs, creating opportunities by unbalancing the defence and opening up the final third. The ability to distribute these clinical balls to the wings was not solely limited to the holding midfielders, with many defenders actively exhibiting their capacity to read the game and also accurately spread the play.


The quality of the wide players made this implemented tactic so successful with exquisite first touches into space and then driving runs with players often displaying the ability to attack a defender 1v1. The high position of the attacking full-backs also assisted in creating superiority on the sides before the defending team could re-balance. The switch of play to open access to the final third proved highly successful, with many goals being created from these advanced lateral positions, as highlighted in the goal analysis. Interestingly, the lack of high pressure seen in Poland marked a difference compared to the FIFA U-20 World Cup 2017, where, as stated in the technical report (page 11), "a lot of the games saw teams playing at high intensity and pressurising with and without the ball."



#### **RAISE TO PROMINENCE**

The interest that this tournament holds for clubs from all around the world was obvious when seated in the stands, with numerous player scouts in attendance at each game, and the players did not disappoint.

#### **GOALKEEPING ANALYSIS**

There were some fine examples of high-level goalkeeping on show in Poland, epitomised by adidas Golden Glove winner Andriy Lunin (1) of Ukraine, whose presence and timing were simply outstanding. As previously discussed, numerous balls were played in behind the defensive line; however, not all ended in goals. There were some fantastic examples of goalkeepers intercepting through-balls both inside and outside the penalty area. Positioning was key, with many goalkeepers finding great starting points and displaying excellent game-reading ability. An outstanding attribute was their capacity to attack directly the path of the ball allowing them to arrive first before fast approaching attackers. The goalkeeper's awareness allowed them to intercept and sweep up many of these through balls before any dangerous situations could occur.


Two prominent law changes by IFAB were introduced during the FIFA U-20 World Cup that directly impacted goalkeepers. Firstly, from goal kicks, outfield players are now able to receive the ball inside the penalty area, whilst the defensive team must still remain outside of the box. A few teams looked to take advantage of this amendment, with Italy having clearly thought through the new possibilities this creates, which led to them attempting to start to build play from inside their own area. The second law change requires goalkeepers to have at least part of one foot on or in line with the goal line when a penalty kick is taken. With VAR in use, this placed a close spotlight on goalkeepers'

movements during penalty kicks, and retakes were occasionally required due to encroachment. With this new law in place and being strictly enforced, goalkeepers may now need to give more thought to how they approach penalty kicks.





#### **INTERVIEWS WITH THE COACHES OF THE SEMI-FINALISTS**

#### **Paolo Nicolato, Italy**

## Could you tell us a bit about your coaching and educational background?

Having only played at amateur level, I started coaching at a very early age, in 1987. I coached in the Italian amateur leagues for about a decade before moving to a professional club, ChievoVerona. I spent many years as the coach of their so-called Primavera team (the U-19s), leading them to the national title, the Scudetto, in 2014. I also served as their first-team assistant coach in the top flight, Serie A, for one year. My next club were Lumezzane in the Italian third division, Serie C. After that, I joined the Italian Football Association (FIGC), where I started out as the U-18 coach. In summary, I've coached professionally for 15 years now, at Chievo, Lumezzane and now as a youth coach for the FIGC.

## How long have you been working for your association and when did you become head coach of the U-20 team?

I signed my contract three years ago. I coached the U-18s in the first year and the U-19s the year after. We reached the final of the [UEFA U-19] EURO [in 2018], but unfortunately we lost it. Now I'm coaching the U-20s with a very similar group to the one that

I started out with three years ago, with a core of players born in 1999.

#### How did you prepare for this tournament?

The main job was to find the right players, due to the [UEFA] U-21 EURO almost overlapping with the U-20 World Cup. With Italy hosting the U-21 EURO, a lot of importance was attached to it and so we lost almost 50% of our squad to the U-21s and had to replace them. Therefore, we devoted a lot of time and energy to getting to know the new players and helping them to gel with the group and bed into our system.

## Does your association have a philosophy when it comes to football development? If so, how would you describe it?

Yes, in my opinion, there is a philosophy in place. There is substantial investment in the national youth teams and we have a great coordinator in Maurizio

Viscidi. He sets out the guidelines and the ethos regarding how we develop and work with young players. There is a lot of collaboration; regular meetings are held between the different coaches. The level of commitment is much higher compared to the past in terms of things like games played and support for away trips. We have also strengthened the structures at clubs a lot.

## Did the association agree to your preparation programme?

Everything is agreed upon, of course. We exchange opinions; we talk about everything with the technical director, who oversees all the national teams. It's a very open environment: we hold lots of discussions. We jointly decided on the path to follow.

## How did the technical director support the preparation of your team?

The technical director supervises everything and we obviously involve him in every decision. He is extremely well versed both technically and tactically. However, he's not dogmatic and doesn't bind us to a single approach; he gives us leeway to choose the most suitable system and game plan according to the characteristics of the players.

## How many members of support staff travelled with the team, what were their roles and how did you select them?

The coaching staff is composed of myself and three others: the goalkeeping coach, the fitness coach and my assistant. Then there is the match analyst and the GPS data analyst. The medical part is very important, so we have two doctors and two physiotherapists. On the administrative side, there are two secretaries.

Needless to say, I chose my staff with the FIGC's blessing. They're the same people that I had with me last year [at the U-19 EURO]: part of the reason was to provide a certain amount of continuity, particularly given that we had to replace 50% of the players. Things went very smoothly last year, we worked really well together, and so we decided to stick with the same set-up and to continue our journey together.

## How do you and your staff support the players' development?

We obviously have to monitor and build on all the work done by the clubs. Many of these players don't play regularly for their clubs, and so see the national team as a great opportunity to show off their skills. We also try to give them the best possible platform to display their qualities from a tactical point of view.

We look at the players first and foremost and go on to make technical and tactical choices on that basis. We do not adapt the players to the playing system, but rather, based on the attributes of the players at our disposal, we come up with a suitable way of playing. I try to play to their strengths and we work a lot on honing them.

How many games did your team play during the preparation phase on the road to the FIFA U-20 World Cup Poland 2019 (the confederation tournament, international tournaments and/or friendlies)? We qualified for the U-20 World Cup in Poland through our runners-up finish at the [U-19] EURO last year. We were able to get together every month this year, although this only coincided with official FIFA international windows on a few occasions, which meant that we rarely had a full-strength squad at our disposal. We also took part in the Eight Nations Tournament, which was an opportunity to see these players in action, as only boys born in 1998 and 1999 were eligible to play. Of course, we only called up boys born in 1999, to tie in with our preparations for the U-20 World Cup. Apart from that, we didn't have the chance to contest any other matches. Therefore, after qualifying, my players played seven games.

Incidentally, we only had four days to prepare ahead of the World Cup and we didn't even have the full squad available, because many were involved in the Serie B and Serie C promotion and relegation playoffs. We had to strike a deal in order to get 13-14 players released.

## How did you monitor and assess the players' fitness levels?

Well, that's the kind of work we delegate to our fitness coach, Vincenzo Pincolini. He is in contact with his counterparts and the medical staff at the various clubs; whenever they perform tests, they share the data with us. That's what we do during the year. It's also part of my job to stay on top of that. We have

to follow this procedure because we don't have that much time to perform that sort of analyses within the national-team set-up. In that sense, it's worth noting that we had to trust the work done by the boys at their clubs because we had no other choice. We didn't have a lot of players available in the lead-up to the tournament, so we had to trust that the lads were ready and well prepared physically.

## What were your biggest challenges in preparing for the tournament?

As I said before, I guess a big challenge was finding a strategy to identify the right players. We tried out 35 players across the Eight Nations Tournament and experimented with different systems across the seven games in that competition to see how they would adapt. We eventually chose a system at the very end based on the players' skills. We had to change some players' positions in order to fill gaps, owing to injuries and players being called up for the U 21s; for example, we were very light in midfield. That was the biggest challenge: to put together a cohesive team and play to their strengths, despite having to use certain players in different roles compared to where they operate at club level.

## What were your main criteria for the selection of your players?

In general, I prioritise technical attributes. Based on how I see the game, I would like all my players to have great technical ability and explosive power. Those are the two criteria that I place the most stock in. However, it's obviously not always possible and you can also have players who perhaps aren't standouts in these areas, but boast great tactical acumen instead.

## Do you analyse your opponents before each match and present the analysis to your players?

Of course. Ahead of matches, we do a collective analysis of the team we're going to face in terms of their approach both in and out of possession. We also analyse the opposition players individually, breaking down their respective strengths and looking at the

individual battles our players are going to encounter. In addition, together with the match analysts, we likewise do a post-match debrief with the players after every game, running through what they did well and not so well. The match analysts have an important job and help us a lot; the FIGC does very good work in this area.

## How would you describe the post-match recovery routine of your team?

It's always different. It took on extra significance this year, given that I didn't have that much depth in the squad. I had far more options last year compared to this time round and so was able to rotate my team more then. The recovery process is different for every player; some boys can take a day or two more to recover compared to others. For that reason, we personalise it, with a different regime for every player.

We tried to prioritise recovery in training sessions during the competition, since it's absolutely crucial, especially because we only used a small number of players, who therefore had a lot of football in their legs. Of course, the doctors and physiotherapists play a key role and do a great job, and it's also one of the fitness coach's main focus areas.

#### **INTERVIEWS WITH THE COACHES OF THE SEMI-FINALISTS**

#### Jorge Célico, Ecuador

## Could you tell us a bit about your coaching and educational background?

I stumbled into coaching. Having hung up my boots aged 29, I was strolling around the streets of my local neighbourhood one day when I bumped into a former director from Atlético Huracán, where I spent my entire youth career as a player. He asked me if I fancied lending a hand at the club's academy and I jumped at the chance. I started working with the youngest age group there, and that's when I enrolled to study at the Adolfo Pedernera [coaching] school in La Plata. I really threw myself into the profession and very quickly found myself given bigger jobs: first as a youth director, next as the head of the youth system and then in the senior game. I forged a career on the basis of the sheer energy I put into my work.

I got my big break at senior level as Huracán's interim coach. The club were in a rut and were bracing themselves to face River Plate away from home. That was a star-studded River side to boot, featuring the likes of [Leonardo] Astrada, [Eduardo] Coudet, [Nelson] Pipino Cuevas and Celso Ayala, and

coached by Manuel Pellegrini. I'll never forget the subsequent sequence of events, which proved lifechanging for me. I asked the club president to give me a free hand to do what I wanted, which was to select six youngsters whom I'd had under my wing, and two of them eventually scored for us in a 2-1 win. That historic victory catapulted me into the media spotlight, which I'd never experienced before. The club's higher-ups asked me to remain in charge, but I declined because I still had unfinished business in the youth ranks. Carlos Babington took the helm instead, but he struggled and I was offered the first team job again. I put together a youthful team and saw out my contract, whereupon I got a call from Ecuador.

I subsequently coached Ecuadorian club Universidad Católica for six months. After returning to Argentina,



Universidad Católica called me again and then El Nacional [another Ecuadorian outfit] approached me about heading up their entire youth set-up. I was lucky enough to have a wonderful crop of young players at El Nacional, including Antonio Valencia, the late [Christian] Chucho Benítez and Pedro Quiñónez, whom I assembled into a brilliant team. Those kids later rose into the first team and won two league titles under Ever Hugo Almeida. After the conclusion of my time at El Nacional, Universidad Católica came back in for me and I wound up spending eight more years there, building the first team around 20-yearolds. After getting promoted, we went on to end the club's 34-year exile from continental action, ultimately securing qualification for continental competitions four times on the spin. These days, Universidad Católica are one of the leading teams in the Ecuadorian league and have fared impressively in the [CONMEBOL] Copa Sudamericana.

## How long have you been working for your association and when did you become head coach of the U-20 team?

Carlos Villacís [the President of the Ecuadorian Football Association (FEF) at the time] contacted me about heading up the Ecuadorian youth national team set-up in 2017, while I was at Universidad Católica. That's also when I took the reins of the U-20s.

## Have you managed a national team before? If so, at what level?

I joined the Ecuadorian Football Association in June 2017; that was my first experience of coaching in international football. I've now been in the job for two years.

I laid out my plans and set about scouting across the country, including assessing players as far down as the third division.

#### How did you prepare for this tournament?

I laid out my plans and set about scouting across the country, including assessing players as far down as the third division. In the absence of a rule requiring youngsters to be given game time in Ecuador, many such players lacked exposure, so we launched a process for which I received great backing from the former board. Consequently, we made an initial selection of 200 players, which I then whittled down to 40, whom I took to play all over the continent, including in Peru, Venezuela and Argentina. We also played against top flight teams in Ecuador. That laid

the groundwork ahead of the [CONMEBOL] South American U-20 Championship [2019, which Ecuador won], where we used practically the same squad as in Poland. I was able to do two very important things during that period: firstly, watch a lot of football in order to select the right players, and secondly, instil my style of play through competitive games. The lads play the way we ask them to and have proven that they are great players. When we started this process, these players were toiling in obscurity, whereas now, some are plying their trade in Europe, while others are being chased by top clubs, and many are already playing top-flight football.

## Does your association have a philosophy when it comes to football development? If so, how would you describe it?

The main aim is to strengthen the youth system, a move that began under the former board. I previously worked under Francisco Egas, the current FEF President, for eight years at Universidad Católica. He knows that processes yield results and his vision revolves around augmenting such processes and providing more tools for the youth set-up, as well as fostering players' intellectual development.

## Did the association agree to your preparation programme?

We've always seen eye to eye. I've only worked at a few clubs, but each time over a long period, and they always offered me new contracts. I'm fortunate in that the FEF President understands my methods and gives me free rein to go about my work, irrespective of the results.

## What is the youth structure like at the FEF and how does your preparation process work?





We have a different coach and specific technical staff for each age group, and then I perform a dual role: besides being in charge of the U-20s, I oversee the direction of all the work carried out. It's very unlikely that any two coaches will think exactly alike, so that's why I draw up general guidelines that focus on the footballing philosophy, rather than on the nuts and bolts of the system or particular training methods. That philosophy rests on certain principles that I see as non-negotiable: taking good care of the ball and making use of passing triangles, overlaps and runs into space to throw off markers.

I look to cultivate five or six things that, if executed right, together serve as a springboard for our footballing philosophy to shine through, even if, say, the U 15 coach elects to play 4 4 2, the U 17 manager lines up in a 4 3 3 and I employ a 4 2 3 1. The ethos behind the system has to be the same. There are certain things that I'm trying to tweak, like the use of long balls, and I strive to emphasise the importance of fair play. But beyond all these ideas, it is the U-20s' impressive performances that vindicate our work.

Moreover, we hold regular training camps and each of our teams has a permanent technical staff. As far as I'm concerned, preparation periods are more important than competitions, because competitions can set you back at times – for example, if you have a bad result, which can be disheartening. A sound planning process underpins these preparation periods for all of the national teams.

## How many members of the support staff travelled with the team and what were their roles?

I have an assistant coach, a fitness coach and a video analyst; they make up the technical staff proper. On top of that, there's a whole range of other support staff: a PR officer, a chef, a coordinator, a doctor, two physiotherapists – because physical recovery is extremely important – and two kit men.

## How do you and your staff support the players' development?

I'm nothing on my own. Everybody plays a highly important role and so does every area. We're like a well-oiled machine and I feel much more relaxed and bewtter supported with the other staff members around me. I couldn't do anything without them.

#### How many games did your team play during the preparation phase on the road to the FIFA U-20 World Cup Poland 2019 (the confederation tournament, international tournaments and/or friendlies)?

We contested around 12 official games against other national teams, which was really important, because in the past, Ecuador would only play a third of that, i.e. four or five games. We played twice apiece against Colombia and Peru, took part in a quadrangular tournament in Venezuela and toured Argentina. We must've played 14 or 15 games in total. Furthermore, during each training camp, we also faced teams from the first and second divisions. We must've completed around 40 competitive matches in total across these camps.

## How did you monitor and assess the players' fitness levels?

Gauging fitness is tricky, because there are always ups and downs. In our case, my fitness coach is in constant contact with his counterparts at the various clubs where the players ply their trade.

## What were your biggest challenges in preparing for the tournament?

The biggest challenge is usually getting the president onside. I had his full backing, but the hardest part is educating the leadership and getting the president to understand the importance of high performance, because that's what international football is all about: competing at the highest level. To reiterate, I've benefited from the full support of the leadership, but still, it's a real challenge to ensure that the most possible energy and investment are poured into the sporting area. That's what produces good results in the long term.

## What were your main criteria for the selection of your players?

From a young age, I've subscribed to Dutch club Ajax's TIPS system, which stands for technique, intelligence, personality and speed. In my opinion, the technical side is vital. One thing that has changed is that Ecuadorian football used to be very much hung up on physique, because Ecuadorian players have a spectacular build, but it lends itself to other sports than football. For football, you need more varied technical prowess and a different type of intelligence compared to a 100m sprinter.

What I've done is place the emphasis on the technical aspect, and I've also held trial camps, in other words, short training camps with players who might never be selected, but whom I wanted to run the rule over. In sum, it's about the technical side, intelligence, personality and speed, and I don't just mean physical speed, but also quick thinking and reading of the game. I think that these days, we've got a technically accomplished side who can impose themselves through their play rather than just their physical strength.

## Do you analyse your opponents before each match and present the analysis to your players?

Whenever I'm back in my room, I'm doing research for the team, watching and rewatching matches involving our upcoming opponents. I take notes and put together summaries of their attacking and defensive play, as well as their set pieces. That aside, we have different platforms at our disposal to monitor players that we're going to be facing on an individual basis. I pull all that together into summaries of no more than 25 minutes. I produce two 25-minute videos, which I use to round off my pre-match team talks. I place a lot of stock in this, because while my team's playing philosophy won't change, our tactical and positional set-up will vary depending on how the opposition play.

## How would you describe the post-match recovery routine of your team?

It's all part of a wider regimen that also includes a balanced diet and both protein and vitamin supplements. Whenever the players report for international duty, we give them supplements – approved ones, of course – and at the end of matches, they get massages, undergo cryotherapy and use a jacuzzi; whatever's necessary. That's why we took two physiotherapists along. The players' diet is meticulously crafted to provide them with carbohydrates, protein and all the necessary nutrients to repair their bodies as quickly as possible. We're also looking to buy some equipment on this front; for example, we've requested that the FEF invest in compression boots, which accelerate the recovery process.

#### **INTERVIEWS WITH THE COACHES OF THE SEMI-FINALISTS**

#### **Chung Jung-yong, Korea Republic**

## Could you tell us a bit about your coaching and educational background?

I used to be a professional player in Korea Republic until I was 29, but unfortunately, due to injuries, I had to retire. After that, I went to Brazil, Argentina, Portugal and China, where I focused on youth football, and after a few years, I came back to Korea Republic and started working for the Korea Football Association (KFA).

## How long have you been working for your association and when did you become head coach of the U-20 team?

I started to work as a coach for the KFA in 2006 and I took over this team in 2017, when we participated in the Asian Championship qualifiers.

## Have you managed a national team before? If so, at what level?

During my time at the KFA, I have managed several teams, including at national youth level, such as U-15, U-19 and U-20.

#### How did you prepare for this tournament?

#### So it's about increasing the players' ability to adapt to new circumstances and solve the problems by themselves.

After the draw, I started to analyse our opponents together with my coaching staff, particularly their regional qualifiers. We then focused on what we could do, including what our strategy would be, our possible formations and how we could respond to the tactics of our different opponents. The top priority was to try to focus on ourselves. We tried to build up enough stamina to compete at a world-class level. We also tried to build a strong bond within the team and strengthen our organisation.

## Does your association have a philosophy when it comes to football development? If so, how would you describe it?

The top priority for me and the KFA is not to give directions to our players, but make sure that they fully understand our team's capabilities and strategy. If players are given particular assignments, I try not to interfere while they work them out and afterwards, I give them feedback about what went well and what



went wrong. So it's about increasing the players' ability to adapt to new circumstances and solve the problems by themselves.

## Did the association agree to your preparation programme?

A large portion of our squad are professional players, so we didn't have enough time to prepare for this tournament because it's not compulsory for the clubs to release the players. So, after the Asian championship, we had four weeks of training camps and I had to utilise all "A" match windows. The KFA gave us their full support and they always give positive feedback when it comes to educating young players.

## How did the technical director support the preparation of your team?

The technical director gives us general advice. There are also KFA's various playing styles, which we are trying to build up within our association. The detailed preparation is developed by our coaching staff.

How many members of the support staff travelled with the team and what were their roles?

# Just as every player has his own role and position, each member of our staff has his own area of expertise.

There are three categories of staff: coaching, medical and administrative. In the coaching team, we have two assistant coaches, one goalkeeping coach and one fitness coach. In the medical team, we have three physiotherapists. The administrative staff comprise a manager, a team doctor, a chef, a media officer, a video analyst and a photographer.

## How do you and your staff support the players' development?

Just as every player has his own role and position, each member of our staff has his own area of expertise, and I'm very thankful to all of them, as they make a lot of sacrifices for their jobs. That was, for instance, one of the reasons why none of our players went back home injured. From A to Z, everyone did his job very well.

How many games did your team play during the preparation phase on the road to the FIFA U-20 World Cup Poland 2019 (the confederation tournament, international tournaments and/or friendlies)?



We played four AFC U-19 Championship qualifier matches, six AFC U-19 Championship matches and four friendlies.

It's a difficult process compared to the World Cup because we play against different teams with different qualities. Korea Republic are one of the strongest teams in the region, so we try to focus on our opponents and the relevant circumstances. We had to adapt to different stadiums and weather conditions because where we play in South East Asia, it is quite humid and hot. After the qualifiers, we had about a year to prepare, which was plenty of time.

## How did you monitor and assess the players' fitness levels?

We do regular check-ups with our fitness and medical teams and during the preparation phase, we focused on the players' physical strength. We tried to create a routine for the matches and information was shared and discussed between us. The medical team works hard to ensure that players recover well. That was key to our team's success. We had a fitness plan in place from the start of preparations right through to the end of the tournament.

## What were your biggest challenges in preparing for the tournament?

We had a long preparation phase as we were together from late April, so the most difficult challenge was to keep the team spirit because if the players are together for a long time, they are likely to suffer from mental fatigue. It was very important to build a bond within our team – not just among our players, but staff members as well.

## What were your main criteria for the selection of your players?

The main criterion is technique – not showing off what you can do, but technique that is applied to the very basic things.

## Do you analyse your opponents before each match and present the analysis to your players?

Our coaching team gets together to analyse all the information that we have about our opponents in

order to tailor the video footage to our needs. After that, we try to focus in detail on the opponents' tactics and how we could break down their defence as well as respond to all the tactical changes during the game. We have a lot of meetings and I may talk to individual players as well if need be.

## How would you describe the post-match recovery routine of your team?

This is an area in which one of our fitness coaches specialises. Supported by our entire coaching team, he analyses the situation concerning the physical condition of every player and focuses on basic things, like resting, eating and sleeping well. Once you have done the basic work, it is easy to make some tweaks. The day after the match, we try to rest and do light conditioning training on the pitch.





#### **INTERVIEWS WITH THE COACHES OF THE SEMI-FINALISTS**

#### **Oleksandr Petrakov, Ukraine**

## Could you tell us a bit about your coaching and educational background?

I have been coaching for almost 30 years. I started out managing amateur teams and then worked with professional clubs in the Ukrainian lower leagues, before moving into youth football in 2001.

## How long have you been working for your association and when did you become head coach of the U-20 team?

I joined the Ukrainian Association of Football (UAF) in 2010, taking charge of the U-16s and coaching that group of players for five years, through to U-20 level. After that, I began working with the 1999 generation, whom I have now also managed for five years.

#### How did you prepare for this tournament?

I didn't have any problems and the UAF management helped us with everything we needed. There are always details that can be improved on, but our preparations were optimal, because we started 12 days prior to the beginning of the competition and had a full squad available.

## Does your association have a philosophy when it comes to football development? If so, how would you describe it?

As soon as Andriy Shevchenko became the head coach of our senior national team, his staff specialists delivered a dedicated seminar for all youth national team coaches, showing us video clips and outlining



various analyses and trends. It helped us to understand his vision and requirements, but it is not always easy to find players who fit the bill.

## Did the association agree to your preparation programme?

The UAF management trust and respect me fully. They do not interfere in my work and they help me with everything. I presented my proposed schedule and plans and they approved everything I requested, including my idea of playing friendly matches against non-European teams prior to the World Cup. We played against Uruguay and South Korea in March and then faced South Africa in Kiev on 18 May. I had used the same approach ahead of the FIFA U-20 World Cup New Zealand 2015.

## How did you monitor and assess the players, including their fitness levels?

## I have also been working with them for the last five years, meaning I know them all inside out.

I keep very close tabs on them; the fact that they are all based domestically helps in that respect. I have also been working with them for the last five years, meaning I know them all inside out. On top of that, I have a very good relationship with their respective clubs' coaches, so it's no problem for me to constantly monitor them.

Prior to the World Cup, we used Polar and Catapult, two GPS tracking systems. I checked all the data from our matches and was able to see that everything was fine with my players' fitness.

## How many members of support staff travelled with the team, what were their roles and how did you select them?

There are four of us on a permanent basis – myself, plus my main assistant coach, Andriy Annenkov; the goalkeeping coach, Vyacheslav Kernozenko; and the fitness coach, Vyacheslav Ruzhentsev. I spent six months last year asking for a dedicated fitness coach. The UAF Executive Committee understood our needs and all national teams have had a dedicated fitness coach since the beginning of this year, ours included.

As the head coach, I oversee the training process, including the fitness regime, but I do so in very close cooperation with the rest of my technical staff. All of them are my friends and they are specialists and



outstanding professionals. I always ask them their opinion, but I make all the decisions myself.

## How do you and your staff support the players' development?

One example is the fact that I play using an unusual 3-4-2-1 formation, which nobody else in Ukraine uses.

Every nation has its own mentality. I know how my players think and how to deal with them. You could say that the "carrot-and-stick" approach remains alive and kicking in our case.

## We've noticed that you always stand during matches...

If I sit down on the bench, my team will immediately start losing (laughing).

How many games did your team play during the preparation phase on the road to the FIFA U-20 World Cup Poland 2019 (the confederation tournament, international tournaments and/or friendlies)?



After the [UEFA U-19] EURO in 2018, which served as the qualifying tournament, we didn't participate in any further competitions. We only played friendlies against Azerbaijan and Poland in November, against South Korea, Uruguay and a local club in Spain in March, and finally against South Africa – six matches in total.

## Did you have any setbacks in preparing for the tournament?

There was only one major setback: Shevchenko gave us permission to call up [Vitaliy] Mykolenko – who is already part of the senior set-up – but he was injured and I didn't want to risk including him in my squad for the World Cup, which was a big loss. However, he was soon able to rejoin the senior squad and even played in their win against Serbia [in a UEFA EURO 2020 qualifier in June], while we won the title, so everything worked out nicely.

## What were your main criteria for the selection of your players?

All aspects are taken into consideration, but we're not spoilt for choice and it's not always easy to find 12-14 players of the requisite standard, let alone more. We are not like Italy, England or France in that respect.

If I hadn't taken that risk, we wouldn't have gone so far. To give you an example, at the [U-19] EURO in Finland [in 2018], we played four matches and won the group, but we weren't able to perform to the best of our ability in the semi-finals due to fatigue. Teams like Italy or France were able to rotate four or five players in every match, but that wasn't an option for us. I took a gamble in Poland, making seven changes for our third match against Nigeria, compared to the line-up from the previous game. The higher-ups were concerned by my decision, but at the end of the day, it paid off. If I hadn't taken that risk, we wouldn't have gone so far.

If a player does not have the human values that I believe in, I will not select him.

We have noticed that some of your players, such as Danylo Sikan, are physically powerful and strong in the air. Is that one of the things that you look for?

Sikan is a U-19 player and did not make a single appearance for my team prior to the U-20 World Cup. However, I monitored him for six months in the lead-up and decided to name him in the squad, which was vindicated. Not only is he a good player, but he is a good person too. Footballing ability is not my only consideration; the human aspect is crucial for me too. If a player does not have the human values that I believe in, I will not select him.

## Do you analyse your opponents before each match and present the analysis to your players?


Yes, of course. I have footage of all the matches involving our upcoming opponents, and the video analyst and my assistant study them in detail and provide me with comprehensive information.

## How would you describe the post-match recovery routine of your team?

I always decide on the process depending on the circumstances, using an individual approach. I gauge how my players are on a daily basis and at the time and decide on the spur of the moment. For example, after one of our matches in Poland, I saw that my players were tired after a long bus journey to and from the venue, so I decided to cancel the scheduled training session and allowed them to go to a water park to relax instead.

Ecuador had a golden opportunity to level matters after Jose Cifuentes had his shirt pulled by Enrico Del Prato. The referee awarded the penalty following a VAR review, but Leonardo Campana had his attempt saved by Alessandro Plizzari seconds before half-time.

Jorge Celico's side ultimately could not find their way past a superb performance from the Italian defence, namely Plizzari.

Tagawa had to exit the game minutes later after he picked up what looked to be a hamstring injury.

Italy did give Japan a scare in front of goal midway through the second half when Marco Olivieri broke free to create a one-on-one with Japan keeper Tomoya Wakahara, but the Kyoto Sanga custodian displayed his quick reflexes and made the crucial save, which proved to be enough to bring his team the point they needed to book their place in the next round.



Less than one minute into the second half Soto snuck past the Nigeria defence yet again, doubling his team's advantage. Chris Gloster played him through beautifully after a marauding run inside from the left-back. Soto then got his feet and hips right, waited for the goalkeeper to collapse and popped the ball into the net with the inside of his right foot.

Nigeria weren't without their chances, leaving the USA scrambling from a flurry of brilliant individual efforts toward the end of the first half. First, substitute Aniekeme Okon's ferocious full volley at the top of the area was saved by Brady Scott. That was followed by forward Maxell Effiom's stinger from outside the right corner of the box which clipped the crossbar a minute later.

In the end the USA were resolute, holding on to greatly lift their chances of advancing from Group D.



Employing their tried-and-true strategy of congesting the middle with three central defenders, Ukraine frustrated the Flying Eagles attack for much of the first half. Danylo Sikan headed home from close range in the 30<sup>th</sup> minute to give Ukraine a 1-0 lead.

Goalkeeper Andriy Lunin denied Muhamed Tijani's penalty seconds before half-time, but could not duplicate the feat when Tijani earned another spot-kick in the 47<sup>th</sup> minute. After VAR confirmed that Denys Popov handled Tijani's shot on goal, the Nigerian forward fired past Lunin to ensure the two sides shared the spoils.

Already guaranteed a place in the knockout stage, the result earned the Ukrainians top spot in Group D with seven points. A superior goal difference means Nigeria will also continue their World Cup expedition, taking four points from three matches and finishing third in the group.



Angel Orelien's powerful shot stung the palms of Alghamdi and substitute Diego Valanta was in the right place at the right time to tap into the open goal.

The result means that Panama advance to the Poland 2019 Round of 16, while Saudi Arabia will be heading home after three consecutive losses.



Colombia somehow survived missing their first two spot-kicks in a penalty shoot-out to outlast New Zealand 5-4 and reach the FIFA U-20 World Cup quarter-finals for the first time since hosting the event in 2011. An entertaining, seesaw 120 minutes had ended 1-1.

Colombia required merely 11 minutes to go ahead from a left-wing free-kick. Ivan Angulo's inviting, inswinging cross was met by Andres Reyes, who glanced his header home from five yards.

New Zealand immediately went on the offensive, with Callum McCowatt a menacing presence, and got their equaliser on 35 minutes. Liberato Cacace fizzed a fine, low cross into the box from the left, and Elijah Just steered it home from close range.

Luis Sinisterra decorated the remainder of the half with his hypnotising trickery, albeit without reward.

Michael Woud made a diving, one-handed save to deny Cucho Hernandez into the second half before a defensive gaffe left just one-on-one with Kevin Mier. The New Zealand No7 lobbed the ball over the Colombia goalkeeper, but Reyes got back to hook the goal-bound ball clear. Just then elected to go solo rather than afford one of two team-mates what would have been a gilt-edged chance, and he was tackled.

Colombia couldn't convert two half-chances in the final ten minutes, but extra-time included two considerable ones. First Mier did superbly to repel Max Mata's header from pointblank range. Then Johan Carbonero made an exhilarating dart from inside his own half into the New Zealand penalty box and cut the ball for Angulo, who, from eight yards out, scuffed his shot, enabling Woud to make a smart save.

Alvarado took it himself, doing what Jordan Rezabala and Leonardo Campana had failed to do and calmly passing the ball low into the middle of the net as Franco Israel dived to his right.

In the 65<sup>th</sup> minute, Ecuador goalkeeper Wellington Ramirez did well to stop Darwin Nunez's close-range toe-poke, but his opposite number could do nothing to prevent Sergio Quintero's firm, low drive from finding the bottom corner ten minutes later.

Ecuador were awarded a penalty late on when Bruno Mendez handled a goal-bound shot, and Gonzalo Plata made no mistake from 12 yards.

Francisco Ortega picked him out in space and Barco's powerful first-time shot from 12 yards deflected off Diaby and into the net.

But Mali caught Argentina sleeping at a set-piece right at the end to force a shoot-out. Sekou Koita rolled the ball forward to Boubacar Konte, who aimed low toward the far post to beat Manuel Roffo.

The Eagles scored all five of their penalties to knock the six-time U-20 World Cup champions out of the tournament and Mali's players ran around the Bielsko-Biala Stadium in celebration after the winning penalty kick.

Korea Republic are through to the Poland 2019 semi-finals after prevailing 3-2 on penalties in an engrossing encounter with Senegal that finished 3-3 at the end of extra time.

Senegal were the more active attackers in the first half at the Bielsko-Biala Stadium and broke through in the 37th minute. Ibrahima Niane's cushioned header from the goal line set up captain Cavin Diagne for an uncontested finish from eight yards. The Young Lions of Teranga held their lead until the 62<sup>nd</sup> minute. Korea Republic earned a penalty after Lee Jisol was pushed in the back inside the 18-yard box, and up stepped Lee Kangin to equalise coolly from the spot.

Seven minutes later Senegal returned the favour after Lee Jaeik was ruled to have handled the ball in the box by the Video Assistant Referee (VAR). Lee Gwangyeon saved Niane's initial spot-kick attempt but was shown a yellow card for coming off his line too soon, and Niane made no mistake with his second try.

Korea Republic desperately searched for the equaliser and found it at the last moment through Jisol's glancing header at the near post eight minutes into stoppage time.

Bursting with confidence heading into extra time, the Taeguk Warriors seized control when Kangin played Cho Youngwook through with an expertly weighted pass in the 96th minute. Youngwook slotted the ball into the net to give Korea Republic the lead for the first time in the match.

Senegal refused to let up, though, and were rewarded in the waning seconds of extra time. Amadou Ciss picked out the bottom corner of the goal from the top of the box to send the game to penalties.

Emblematic of the day's performance, Korea Republic fell behind by missing their first two spot-kicks but battled back to advance to the semi-finals, with Oh Sehun converting his side's final attempt while Diagne's effort for Senegal went over the crossbar.

Ukraine are bound for their first FIFA U-20 World Cup final after defeating Italy 1-0 at the Gdynia Stadium on Tuesday.

Serhii Buletsa and Yukhym Konoplia provided the moment of magic in the 65th minute. Ukraine's No10 popped up in the penalty area to receive Konoplia's low cross and steer it into the net from ten yards.

After a scoreless first half, Gli Azzurrini looked close to breaking the game open before falling behind. Roberto Alberico's through ball in the 52<sup>nd</sup> minute split Ukraine's central defence and left Andrea Pinamonti one-on-one with Andriy Lunin. But the Italy captain's blast was aimed directly at Lunin's chest and the goalkeeper comfortably blocked the attempt.

Ukraine nearly doubled their advantage seven minutes after taking the lead. Oleksii Kaschuk played Vladyslav Supriaha in on goal with a well-weighted chip but the forward dragged his shot inches wide of the far post.

Italy had the ball in the net one minute into second-half stoppage time, but Gianluca Scamacca's apparent equaliser was waived off after the Video Assistant Referee (VAR) ruled that he had fouled Valerii Bondar while jostling for position in the penalty area.


Korea Republic booked a first-ever ticket to the FIFA U-20 World Cup final with a 1-0 victory over Ecuador in Lublin.

The eastern Polish city will forever hold a special place for the Koreans, as it's the same venue in which they defeated continental rivals Japan in the Round of 16.

Choi Jun scored the winning goal late in the first half, finishing off a well-worked free-kick. Taegeuk Warriors star Lee Kangin split Ecuador's defence with a perfectly-weighted throughball, and Jun curled in a shot with his right foot past the outstretched arms of Ecuador goalkeeper Moises Ramirez.

Korea Republic's goal came just a minute after Ecuador striker Leonardo Campana struck the crossbar after some brilliant footwork in the build-up. Then, in the final minute of stoppage time, Lee Gwanyeon made a save-of-the-tournament contender, parrying Campana's close-range header wide.

The result means that Saturday's final will be a first for both Korea Republic and Ukraine.

Ecuador achieved their best-ever finish at a FIFA U-20 World Cup on Friday by defeating Italy 1-0 in extra time of the third-place match at Gdynia Stadium.

The two sides entered the game with contrasting strategies: Ecuador's Jorge Celico made just one change from his semifinal starting line-up while Italy's Paolo Nicolato made six, opting to bench standouts Andrea Pinamonti and Alessandro Plizzari.

Following a tense opening period, La Tricolor began to dominate in the second half. Leonardo Campana came closest to the opener in the 56th minute when his long-distance strike pinged the far post.

Gli Azzurrini won a penalty less than five minutes into the first period of extra time but Moises Ramirez stretched to his left to save Marco Olivieri's attempt, keeping the match scoreless.

Nine minutes later Ecuador took advantage of the lifeline Ramirez provided. Olivieri's attempted clearance of a freekick fell directly in front of Richard Mina at the far post, and the Ecuadorian defender tucked the ball into the net for the match-winning goal.

Ukraine are FIFA U-20 World Cup champions for the first time after coming from behind to defeat Korea Republic 3-1 in the Poland 2019 final at Lodz Stadium.

Korea Republic struck quickly through Lee Kangin, who converted his penalty in the fifth minute after a Video Assistant Referee (VAR) check determined that captain Hwang Taehyeon was tripped inside the right edge of the box.

The Ukrainians poured on pressure as the first half progressed, however, culminating in Vladyslav Supriaha's 34th-minute equaliser. Korea Republic could not fully clear Serhii Buletsa's free-kick delivery into the penalty

area, and Supriaha pounced on the loose ball to poke home from eight yards.

Supriaha completed his brace eight minutes into the second half. Yukhym Konoplia's deflected through ball skipped into the Ukrainian forward's path and he beat the goalkeeper one-on-one to put his side on top.

A marauding run from Heorhii Tsitaishvili in the 89th minute sealed the match and the championship for the Ukrainians. The midfielder surged forward from his own half and cracked a shot into the corner of the net.

From never progressing past the Round of 16 to lifting the trophy, Ukraine's unprecedented run to the title will be an enduring memory of Poland 2019.
