CC / CA	Conference Committee, Amendment "A"
Carried over	An LD is held over to the next session of the Legislature

Died between houses	House and Senate cannot agree on the same action for a bill. The bill dies.
Died in concurrence	The LD dies when both Houses agree on dispositions that have the same effect.
Died on adjournment	When the Legislature adjourns sine die and the LD was neither enacted nor killed by action of the House or Senate. The bill dies.
Emerg.	See "Emergency enacted".
Emergency enacted	The LD is enacted by 2/3 or more of the members of the House and Senate. The Legislation takes effect sooner than the statutory 90 days.
Enacted	The bill was passed and sent to the Governor for signature.
Finally passed	Resolve/resolution enacting language.

HP	House Paper. A document before the Legislature, i.e. Senate Paper or House Paper.
Held by the Governor	An enacted bill is neither signed, vetoed, or allowed to become law. If a new Legislative session is held, the Governor must take action on it within three days. If no session occurs, this becomes a "Pocket Veto".
IB	Initiated Bill. A legislative proposal originated by citizen petition, usually rejected by the Legislature and sent referendum.
Indef. P.P.	Indefinitely postponed. Kills the item if both chambers agree.

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LD	Legislative Document. A number assigned when
	the Bill is received by the Clerk or Secretary,
	printed, and distributed to the public.
LR	Legislative Request. Assigned by the Revisor of
	Statutes when a request for a Bill is made. LR
	numbers are used to track a bill until it is printed
	as a Legislative Document (assigned an LD
	number).
LV/WD	Leave to Withdraw. Report by a committee to
	recommend the withdrawal of a measure by
	unanimous vote before a public hearing occurs.
LV/WD – Other Leg	Leave to withdraw, covered by other legislation.
