One: If a student has previous background in Chinese language and is initially placed (after the Chinese placement test and interview) in upper division classes above CHN 231 (e.g. CHN 232 or 301), the student will fulfill the total 9 credits requirement by taking additional classes in categories II (language courses above CHN 302) [see note 2 for listings] and/or III (courses in English that focus on China/Chinese language and culture) [see note 3 for listings].

Two: The following courses currently fulfill this requirement: CHN 320 (Special Topics in Chinese), CHN 351 (Chinese Language and Society through the Media), CHN 360 (Professional Chinese) or the equivalent of a CHN 320 or above course taken during *Term in China* at ECNU and/or other approved study abroad language programs.

Three: At least one course must examine transnationalism/regionalism/global perspectives or compare China/Chinese with other countries/cultures through specific disciplines (e.g. art, religion, literature, history, philosophy, economics, and political science) [see lists below]. At least one of these four courses must be 300-level, and no more than one at 100-level. One of these courses can be an Independent Study (Capstone project) or the Asian Studies senior seminars (ASN 397 and ASN 399). The Asian Conversation sequence (ASN 210, 215/6, 220) will count for no more than two courses.
