





The Children of Lir Mural Project at Corpus Christi School

Corpus Christi Girls' School is situated on Homefarm Road in Drumcondra. During the last school year we decided that we would like to brighten up the school yard. With lots of help from our Parents Association, we set about an improvement project that would include the whole school community. Over 25 parents designed and planted a new garden, painted the walls and basketball posts, painted new games on the yard and together we started a whole school art project to paint a mural.

The story of 'The Children of Lir' was selected as a theme and a local artist and parent Carmen Tuohy was commissioned to do the drawings. The teachers read and explored the famous Irish legend with their classes and the children interpreted it through art, drama and story writing. In the end, five large murals, each measuring 1.2m x 1.8m were planned.

Wooden panels were bought and our school caretaker Tony prepared them with special white primer. Carmen worked with each class and explained how the scenes told the story in sequence. She then

demonstrated and practiced painting techniques with a group of 16 parents who had volunteered to help.

When we were ready to start painting, each class was divided into small groups of between 5 and 10 pupils. The

children took it in turns and worked with Carmen and with the parent volunteers to paint the mural over a period of 4 weeks. We started with the youngest children and the lightest colours. Then steadily, we worked our way through the school and through a range of deeper shades and tones until the scenes came together.

Every child in the school participated and the excitement could be seen throughout the project. We painted the young children of Lir, their wicked stepmother, their transformation into

swans by a terrible spell, their lonely life on the seas and the waves and finally their return to human form having heard the Christian bell.

A final coat of varnish will be needed before the mural can be mounted and displayed outdoors. Our playground redevelopment has been a wonderful project. It has brought out the best in everyone. Our garden, the painting of the playground and our artistic mural will be a fantastic addition to Corpus Christi School in the years ahead. Watch out for it if you are passing up Home Farm Road in Drumcondra.

- Using old newspapers for wrapping paper is a novel way to add a vintage look to your presents.



He's behind you!!!

A short history of pantomime

One of the most enjoyable parts of Christmas is going to the Pantomime. Have you ever wondered how this rowdy mixture of song and dance, princes and villains, actors in animal costumes and men in women's dresses ever came about?

Pantomime as we know it today is the result of mixing many different forms of theatre. Amazingly, Pantomime was a popular form of entertainment in ancient Rome and Greece and absorbed elements of Commedia dell'arte, a type of theatre performed in Italy and France during the 16th century.

By Victorian times, the stories used in pantomime were mostly fairy stories or folk tales like 'Cinderella', 'Dick Whittington', 'Aladdin' and 'Snow White'. Other popular shows are 'Jack & the Beanstalk', 'Puss in Boots', 'Sleeping Beauty' and 'Mother Goose'. Some shows are based on original books such as 'Peter Pan' and 'Robinson Crusoe'.

During the last century many of the traditions we associate with Pantomime were well established. The older woman – the Pantomime Dame – is played by a man, as are the Ugly Sisters in Cinderella, while the Principal Boy is often a girl! Animal characters, such as the Pantomime horse or Jack's cow in 'Jack and the Beanstalk' are played by two (probably quite uncomfortable) actors, in an animal costume.

Of course, the audience is expected to play a big part – answering 'Oh, Yes he is!' or 'He's Behind You!' to the characters on stage. Music is also very important, many of the songs are set to popular tunes which all the audience will know, and there is always a singalong.

In more recent times, it has become a tradition of having a celebrity take part – such as a soap star or a singer.

Look out for Jedward and Samantha Mumba this year in Dublin

To read the original stories of the pantomimes have a look at books of fairy tales by the great collectors – the Brothers Grimm and Charles Perrault. Roald Dahl also wrote versions of 'Jack and the Beanstalk' and 'Cinderella' in his collection of 'Revolting Rhymes'.

Here is a selection of fairy stories, folk tales and books in Dublin Libraries some of which inspired the pantomimes.


Children save Dublin: read all about it!

Looking at Art in Dublin City Gallery The Hugh Lane

The Diligence in the Snow by Gustave Courbet

The Diligence in the Snow is a very large painting by the French artist Gustave Courbet (1819-1877). This painting shows a huge snowdrift covering the French countryside. So much of the painting is covered in white, you can almost feel the cold. To one side of the painting there are farm houses and looming in the distance are large grey clouds. A carriage pulled by oxen and horses is stuck in the snow. Some people, perhaps the passengers and local farmers, are trying to help the struggling animals and overturned coach. If you look closely you can see someone sitting on one of the oxen. His hands are pulled inside his coat and held close to his body



for warmth. The view in this painting seems to go on for miles.

Beyond the trees in the distance are snow capped blue mountains even further away.

Did you know?

Diligence is the French word for a stagecoach which brought people from place to place before cars, trains or buses. Does the way the artist has painted the snow remind you of anything? Do you think it looks like big waves in an ocean? One of the original titles for this painting was 'Naufrage Dans la Neige' which in French means 'Shipwreck in the Snow'.


Winter Art Workshops

How to make a paper angel

You will need:

- Paper plate or silver/gold doily
- Pencil
- Colouring pencils / markers
- Scissors (ask an adult to help you)
- * Stapler and staples
 - Glitter / decorations
- Lollipop stick
- ★ Glue
- Take a circular paper plate or a silver/gold doily.
- 2 Draw the figure as shown.
- 3 Cut out area A (penciled in blue).
- Cut along lines B and C.
- Shape the curved lines D and E.
- Take point B and point C and curve to back of angel and staple together. This creates curve on dotted line.
- 7 Draw arms, circle (for the hands) star and face, and decorate with markers, or stick on any glitter you might have.
- 8 Take lollipop stick and glue behind line F and G.

At Christmas we all like to celebrate and relax by eating nice food. It is good to enjoy food. But have you ever thought about all the food that is not eaten but is just thrown in the bin? This happens not only at Christmas but all year round.

What a waste of money!

Did you know that a third of the food we buy ends up in the bin, costing the average family about €80 every month? Just think of what you could buy for that money instead.

So what can you do about it?

The good news is that food waste can be avoided, it is easy to do and everyone can help. Before you can do something about it you will need to know what food you are throwing away.

Here is an idea. Put a list on your fridge door for one week. Everyone in the family should write down every piece of food that they throw out during the week. That way you will find out what food you are wasting and maybe why you are wasting it. Are you buying too much of one food item like bread or milk and you do not get to use it before it goes out of date?

The main foods that Irish families throw out are fruit and vegetables – apples, bananas, grapes, potatoes and salads. We also throw out meat, fish, yogurts, bread, milk, spreads and dips. Check your list of wasted food and see how it compares to our list above!

But why do we waste food?

There are three main reasons why food ends up in the bin:

Some food waste is inevitable, for example, tea bags, banana skins and apple cores. So what should you do with it?

Feed animals – some food waste is suitable for dogs and other pets. But be careful, adults should always be aware of what food is safe.

Compost – If you have a compost bin in your garden you can put all raw fruit and vegetables waste into it. This is nature's way of recycling organic materials.

Brown bin – You can put all food waste into your brown bin, including meat, fish and dairy products.

Help the environment and your family!

You can help to reduce food waste by reminding everyone that

- By preventing food waste you save **twice**: by buying less food and by having less to dispose of.
- Wasting food is also bad for the environment. If we stop wasting food, the impact on the environment would be the same as taking 1 in 4 cars off our roads.


