

Why becoming a Sanctuary Church is important to me

All four of my grandparents were immigrants to this country. My Mom's parents were brought here by their parents when they were children - sounds familiar! They came from Sweden during the late 1800's. Farmland was scarce in the homeland and prospects were bleak. They emigrated to Northern Wisconsin. My Dad's parents came from Sweden and England as adults and settled in Chicago. Both my parents loved and were proud of their heritage but were also grateful to be in the United States because of the opportunities available to them and their children.

I have two personal experiences to share besides my heritage which makes me sympathetic to those who come here for a better life. When I was in graduate school at University of Iowa, I worked for a grant program which created educational materials in languages besides English. I worked with translators for Spanish, Lao, Vietnamese, Thai, and Cambodian. This was the early 80's and some co-workers were high ranking refugees from these countries. One man from Columbia, South America was here on a student visa and feared returning to his homeland because he was gay. He said if he returned he would be killed.

My second experience was early in my employment with the East Moline Schools. Our English as a Second language teacher had married an undocumented man and as time passed they had two children. One night, ICE banged on their door and took her husband. He was deported. He had no criminal record! This took place in the late 90's. It took over two years to get him back. Our principal, myself and others wrote supportive statements and our congressman also helped.

My heritage and my experiences tell me that people and their freedoms are important. Three of our principles highlight my beliefs. I believe in the inherent worth and dignity of every person. I believe in the goal of world community with peace, liberty, and justice for all and I believe in justice, equity, and compassion in human relations. I recognize the human struggle for a better life and if that struggle brings you here and you are peaceful, you should have the same rights that I have.

The call to witness and act for justice in our society and in the world is clear. So, too, is the call to examine our structures and practices, dismantling and transforming those which fail to recognize the full humanity of all people and to honor the interdependent web of life. Join us in Kansas City as we dive deeply into questions of mission for our Unitarian Universalist Association, for our congregations and communities, and for each of us as individuals.

So, think about attending GA this year. It is an opportunity for personal growth, as well as for bringing what you learn and experience back to enhance our congregational life.
