After your student has read for 30 minutes please take time to talk to them about what they read. The following are some suggested questions to guide that discussion. If your student doesn't have the ability to discuss with someone at this time answer the questions in writing.

- -Has anything in your life happened that is similar to the things that happened in the story?
- -Did anything in the story happen that has happened to you? Tell me about it.
- -Why do you think the author chose the title for this story?
- -Point out details in the pictures.
- -Were there any words in the story you did not know?
- -If you could talk with one of the characters in the story, which character would you choose and what would you talk about?

Nonfiction

- -What was this book about?
- -What did you know about this topic before you started reading it?
- -What did you learn about this topic?
- -What was the most interesting fact in this book?
- -How can you use this information?
- -Describe your favorite picture in the book.
- -How could you explain this information to someone who hasn't read this book?

During Reading

- 3. While you were reading today, what did you picture in your mind about the story?
- 4. Which character can you connect with the most in your book?
- 5. Which part of your book are you having the most difficulty understanding or connecting with?
- 6. What have you done that is similar to what the characters experience in your book?
- 7. How realistic is the plot of your book?
- 8. What issue in your book has caused you to think the most?
- 9. What kind of message does the author want the reader to get from this book/story?
- 10. What issue in your book is the most interesting? Upsetting? Familiar? Ridiculous? Confusing?
- 11. How does the setting of your book contribute to the mood of the story?
- 12. What are the problems the main character faces and how are they solved?
- 13. How do two of the characters in your book differ from each other?

<u>Upper School (7th/8th) Reading Discussion Questions</u> Fiction

Ask BEFORE reading:

- 3. What do you think will be the character's motivation? Why are they doing to do what they're going to do?
- 4. What do you know about the setting (the time and place)? Have you been anywhere similar, or know about it from other places?

Ask DURING reading:

- 1. What do you think the theme might be? Remember, the theme is NOT a single word/topic. It's what the author is saying about that single word or topic.
- 2. What point of view does the author use? What do we know about the storyteller?
- 3. Do any of the characters remind you of people from real life? Friends, family, celebrities. Could you create a movie cast for this book?
- 4. Can you connect with any of the characters on a personal level? Have you ever felt the same way they have? Or been in a similar situation?

Ask AFTER reading:

- 1. Compare/contrast this book to something we read in school, or another text you've read. What about movies or shows?
- 2. Where have you seen this same plot before? If you can't think of one, dig deeper. There's always a similar story out there.
- 3. What would you change about this story? What parts did you want to know more about and which did you want to read less about? Would you change the character?
- 4. What questions do you still have about this book?

Nonfiction

(These questions can mostly be used during any stage of reading; before, during, or after)

- 1. What is the purpose of this piece of writing? Is it teaching? Persuading?
- 2. What is the author's position on the topic? How do you think they feel about their topic?
- 3. What is the author's credibility? What makes them qualified to write it? Is it a scientific article written by a football player?
- 4. Who is the target audience? Who does the author expect to read this article? Why are they writing it to that audience?
- 5. What evidence does the author use to prove their point?
- 6. How do you feel about the author's point? Do you agree or disagree? Why?
- 7. What would you change about the way the author presented the information? Was it clear and easy to understand?
- 8. What information was already familiar to you? How much did you know about this topic?
- 9. What was the most interesting fact you learned?
- 10. How could you apply what you learned to your life?
