

EBOOKS AND AUDIO BOOKS FOR ECC STUDENTS

The library staff of ECC herein lists various Internet sites you can access to secure both eBooks and audio books for free. All of them have thousands or over a million free items you can access for your reading and research.

Unfortunately, you probably will not find any of your assigned textbooks on any of the listed sites, except for classic (older) novels and short stories you may be assigned in English courses.

Depending on where you live, you may or may not be able to access all sites. Several of the sites are subscribed to by selected local public libraries for their local patrons. Not all public libraries subscribe to all sites.

- 1) overdrive.com/apps/libby Newark Public Library participates. Get the app to borrow thousands of eBooks and audiobooks.

- 2) Elibrarynj.overdrive.com Started as a downloadable digital media collection for central New Jersey, it now serves public libraries throughout Essex County. Be sure to have your library card ready. Contains about 30,000 fiction and non-fiction eBooks.
- 3) free-ebooks.net Contains thousands of eBooks in a wide variety of subjects. Current fare. Become a member and you will be allowed to download five free books a month.
- 4) www.hoopladigital.com Hoopla, among the most popular digital media resources online, has a catalog of more than 300,000 eBooks, streaming movies, television shows, music albums, and audiobooks. Sign up for free. Not all public libraries participate.
- 5) bookboon.com 1,000 books by professors at top universities. You have to sign up to access them. When you visit the site, choose “sign up for free books.” Books are on engineering, human resources, communication, Microsoft Office products, computer science and IT, business, economics and finance, management, etc.
- 6) books.google.com In Google Books, type in author or title. To see which books you can read, click on “Any View” in the upper bar. From a drop-down menu, select “Free Google eBooks” to see the books that can be read online.
- 7) Guttenberg.org Project Gutenberg has over 60,000 classic books, both fiction and non-fiction. Easy to use format.

- 8) [Archive.org/details/texts](https://archive.org/details/texts) Internet Archive has 1.3 million eBooks that are accessible once you register for an account. Be patient; the site can be somewhat confusing.
- 9) openlibrary.org Brought to you by the Internet Archive people, but in an easier-to-use format. You can go to the Classic Books section, which has over three million books online. If the “Read” button is shown, you can read or download the book. Open Library also has contemporary books you can read. To access any of these books, you’ll have to register with Open Library.
- 10) [Librivox.org](https://librivox.org). This is an attempt to get as many audiobooks online in as many languages as possible; currently 41 languages are represented. Classics in English are well represented (both fiction and non-fiction). Well worth a try.
