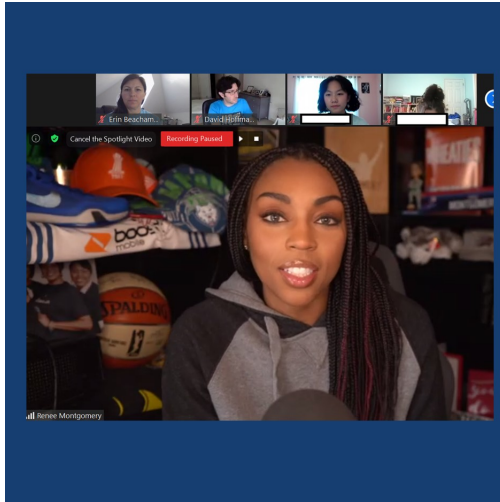
No Place for Hate Summit 2021

Changing the World One Word at a Time

This national read aloud webinar (for educators, young people and the general public) will take place on **Thursday February 11th at 4:00 pm ET**.

Jerry Craft, the *New York Times* bestselling and Newbery Medal winning author/illustrator of the graphic novel, *New Kid*. *New Kid* is the first graphic novel to receive the Newbery Medal, which is considered the most prestigious

U.S. children's book award. *New Kid* is about a 12-year-old boy named Jordan who lives in NYC and dreams of going to art school, but his parents instead enroll him in a private school where he navigates being one of the few Black students at school. Jerry Craft's second graphic novel, *Class Act*, is a companion to his first graphic novel and was published in 2020.
